



About Consent

Overview: Because you are offering screening to all of your families, and using a parent-completed tool, consent is simple. You only need to inform your parents about your screening program. This can be done through a parent letter, or in your parent handbook. Parental consent is considered implied, unless a parent tells you they do not want to screen their child.

Here is an example of how you can introduce screening to your families.

Example of “Implied Consent” Language to Include in a Parent Handbook or Parent Letter:

Developmental Screening and Monitoring Program. One of the services we provide at *(insert name of your program)* is a developmental and social-emotional screening/monitoring program. Screening provides a quick check to make sure your child’s development is on-schedule. We work together with parents to screen children shortly after enrollment, and then re-screen once a year. We use a parent-completed screening tool, recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics called the Ages & Stages Questionnaires (ASQ). The ASQ helps identify your child’s strengths and areas where they could use more practice. Your teacher will talk to you more about the ASQ, they will help you get started on completing the ASQ, and then you and your child’s teacher will meet together to review the items and discuss the results. You may also complete a questionnaire about your child’s social-emotional development, the ASQ: Social-Emotional (ASQ:SE). If you do not wish for your child to participate in this program for some reason, please talk to *(insert name of director, provider)*.*
